The Archbishop of Canterbury distracts Henry's to France attention, away from the Church in England. Salic Law and the Dauphin's gift of tennis balls persuade him to claim France's throne. Before he left, English rebels plotted Henry's assassination and were executed. He took Harfleur with heavy losses.
